The following seem to be the key views of Probians across many countries.

- **Welcoming Atmosphere:** A friendly and warm atmosphere is crucial in creating a sense of belonging within the Club. New members should feel welcomed and embraced, and existing members should foster an inclusive culture that encourages everyone to connect and forge meaningful friendships.
- Have a good variety of speakers and activities: Offering diverse speakers and activities enriches the community experience, providing valuable knowledge and entertainment. Speakers from different backgrounds and fields bring fresh perspectives, sparking curiosity and engagement among members.
- Reduce the formality of meetings: By creating a relaxed and informal atmosphere, meetings become more welcoming and conducive to open communication. Minimising rigid structures and encouraging an open exchange of ideas empowers members to express their thoughts freely.
- Strong Leadership and Organisation: Effective leadership and well-structured management contribute to a Club's success. Clear communication, efficient organisation of activities, and transparent decision-making processes promote a smoothly functioning and member-driven organisation.
- Serve a good Morning Tea: The provision of morning tea or refreshments during meetings fosters a sense of hospitality and camaraderie. It serves as a natural icebreaker, giving members an opportunity to mingle and converse informally.
- Make sure that members mix around and don't form cliques: Preventing the formation of cliques is essential for maintaining a harmonious and inclusive community. Organisers can implement strategies like random seating arrangements, icebreaker activities, or group rotations to encourage members to interact with different people. Promoting a culture of inclusivity and openness discourages exclusivity and ensures that all members feel welcome and valued.

These strategies contribute to a sense of belonging and ownership, making the Club a place where members are proud to be part of. Think about it!

COMMUNICATION

What is Communication? It is simply the act of transferring information from one place, person, or group to another. Every communication involves (at least) one sender, and message and a recipient.

Having a strong internal communication process in your club not only ensures that everyone in your club stays on the same page, but it can also assist in strengthening your club's identity.

Communication is key for your club. It is the x-factor for retaining and growing your membership. A smart communication effort can create a feeling of community within your club. It can build a sense of belonging and boost member engagement.

The ideal approach for club communication is to allow your members engage with the tools they feel most comfortable using e.g., email, hard copy, or telephone. Not all members are tech savvy. This improves the potential of members receiving communications and engaging with you.

The Secretary usually plays a major role in club communication e.g., sending out agendas, minutes, communications from PAWA and PSPL and any other information sent to club members. The Secretary is also the key point for incoming and outgoing correspondence. It is usually their job to pass on the necessary communications to members.

Committee members should communicate outside of monthly meetings, rather than wait 30 days for the next committee meeting to make a decision. Any important decision made outside of a committee meeting can be ratified at the next meeting so that a record is in the minutes of the decision.

All members should be provided with a copy of the **Club's Constitution and Standing Resolutions.** As a communication tool, a constitution is a necessary part of any club because it clarifies your member's purpose, explains any hierarchy or structure, and provides the foundation for successfully advancing your club's mission.
