WHAT IS THE ROLE OF THE CLUB'S MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE?

WAYS TO REDUCE DEALING WITH CASH AT MEETINGS



Receiving cash at meetings can be problem these days. Banks are closing branches and it means more travel to make deposits. With fuel being as expensive as it is the Treasurer having to wear this cost. Most people use tapand-go card technology to pay for groceries. Clubs can use this same technology to receive payments.

A very small number of members may not be willing to go down this path. These members should be accommodated but going cashless for the majority is still a step forward in efficiency for the club.

Advantages for members:

- You don't need to remember to take cash;
- A printed receipt can be provided, or it can be sent by email or text;
- Your transactions appear on your bank statement.

Advantages for the club Treasurer:

- You don't need to remember to make cash available for change (if all members participate);
- You don't need to handle much cash (if any) after the meeting, with the risk of loss or theft;
- The funds are transferred to the club's bank account with the transaction fee already deducted and fully documented.

Typical transactions are:

- Initial membership joining fees and membership renewals;
- Meeting entrance fees (either per meeting day or for the whole year in advance);
- Payment for outings.

One Possible Solution Is To Use a Square Terminal

These machines are used in quite a few clubs throughout WA.



Takes payments quickly and every entry is securely encrypted. Clubs pay the same simple rate for every tap or insert: 1.6%. The club can get the funds as fast as the next day.

- The Square Terminal provides all-in-one capabilities for taking payments and printing receipts.
- Get up and running straight away with no long-term contracts or monthly recurring charges.
- It takes magstripe card payments, chip card payments and NFC tap-and-go functionalities, including Apple Pay and Google Pay.
- It accepts the taps, swipes, and dips of all major cards.

SCAM ALERT

"The nationwide scourge of scammers stealing money from unsuspecting and vulnerable individuals has turned its ugly head towards clubs and charities in WA.

Payment redirection scams cost Australian businesses over \$14 million in 2021 and WA ScamNet is warning committee members to be on high alert for impersonators of third-party suppliers in particular.

Consumer Protection was recently informed of a WA association, which was duped out of \$70,000 by a sophisticated email payment scam. Scammers posing as the president of the association requested a number of payments from the treasurer, who unfortunately transferred money electronically to the requested account without question.

Many clubs and charities are run by volunteers and it appears scammers have identified this as a susceptible target market. We ask that you ensure your committee members are on alert for potential scams. Please read and follow the advice on the **Payment Redirection Scams** page on the WA ScamNet website."

(It shows that payment redirection scams, also known as business email compromise, were the most financially damaging scams for Australian businesses in 2021. In a payment redirection scam, scammers impersonate a business or its employees via email and request an upcoming payment be redirected to a fraudulent account.)

"Committee members should also take this opportunity to review their payment practices and ensure proper controls are in place. These may include, but are not limited to, ensuring a valid invoice is received for each payment and matched to a purchase order or approval for the purchase; requiring at least two persons to effect a payment; passwords are not shared or written down and bank statements are regularly reconciled."

The **Scamwatch website** provides a range of resources to help businesses avoid scams. Businesses that have been scammed should contact their bank as soon as possible. Businesses that are the victims of a cybercrime, such as payment redirection scams or ransomware, should report the incident to ReportCyber as soon as possible. ReportCyber is run by the Australian Cyber Security Centre and passes reports to law enforcement agencies for assessment and intelligence purposes."
