Edmund Barton was the first Prime Minister. The people of Sydney celebrated Federation with a week of festivities.


The First Parliament met in Parliament House.

Message from Judith Maestracci AM, Chairman 2021-2022, Probus South Pacific Ltd. The Probus South Pacific Limited (PSPL) Board recently set the capitation fees for the 2022 – 2023 Probus year. Fees are set in November to provide Management Committees with time to prepare their budgets for consideration at Club Annual General Meetings.

PSPL's primary role is to provide service and support through a range of administration, insurance, member benefit and support services, which continue to evolve and increase to meet the needs of our Community.

Despite the continuing challenges of COVID-19, our key focus of membership retention and growth has not changed. We continue to build awareness of Probus in the wider community through initiatives such as Probus Day, Partnerships, digital programs for Clubs and members and our range of regular publications.

It is very encouraging to see so many Clubs utilising our complimentary promotional material as part of their overall membership objectives - which reflects a positive outlook for the future.

When determining annual capitation fees, the PSPL Board has a responsibility to act reasonably to ensure that fees are kept as low as possible and also set at a sufficient level to support the range of services provided by PSPL.

The Board has considered the challenges facing our Community since the onset of the pandemic and, although PSPL has faced similar challenges, has resolved to maintain the level of capitation fees at \$15.00 per annum per member.

PSPL will continue to provide the <u>Active Retirees national publication in digital form</u> on a complimentary basis. Although it is understood that some Club members may prefer to have this provided in print, this option is not viable at this time. The Board will continue to review this on an ongoing basis.

Capitation fees are payable by 30 April 2022 and the usual forms for your completion will be sent to your Club early in the New Year.

5 ways to help make your phone battery last longer.

1. Keep The Brightness Down

One simple way to start conserving battery power– turn down the screen brightness.

2. Avoid Extreme Charging

A common mistake people make is to fully charge their phone up to 100 percent, then let it drain completely. Newer lithium-ion batteries don't have memories that need to be 'calibrated' in this way; you're reducing its lifespan even faster. Partially charging and discharging your phone battery is the best way to achieve longevity. Avoid leaving your phone to charge overnight, as this causes the battery to experience high stress and potentially damaging heat. If you do charge it at night, keep it in a cool place.

3. Switch Off Wi-Fi And Bluetooth

Look for ways to help your battery last longer on a single charge. A good place to start is being aware that Wi-Fi and Bluetooth are draining your battery as they scan for devices or networks to connect to in different locations.

4. Limit Location Services

To support their services, many of your favourite apps – including food delivery, fitness monitoring or direction finding apps – likely use location-based technology such as GPS, Wi-Fi, Bluetooth and cellular networks to track your phone. The scanning process itself can seriously sap battery life. You can adjust the settings and preferences to either block apps from using location services in the background, or disable scanning altogether. Specific apps will still be able to access location services when they're actually in use.

5. Manage Your Apps More Effectively

Closing everything that's running on your device is not the battery-saving solution you may have expected. The action of force-quitting apps can have a negative impact. You're better off letting apps run in the background so iOS and Android systems can take advantage of their built-in algorithms that automatically manage the amount of power and memory being used. Check whether certain apps are constantly refreshing with updates for no valid reason. It's possible to review and limit how much battery an individual app is using on your phone.

Start planning early!

Being on a Committee is a team effort! Outgoing Management Committee members can all help make a smooth transition:

- By ensuring members understand the role of the management committee positions. It is a good idea to have a role description that works for your club, for each position.
- By inviting members throughout the year to observe a meeting to have an idea of the process.
- By meeting with incoming members to ensure urgent matters receive attention. This is also to ensure there is continuity regarding the Association's Policies, Procedures and important contacts (i.e. Accountants, Auditors and Peak Bodies.)
- By updating bank accounts to reflect new signatories and removing any committee members who have left.
- By giving consideration to appointing assistants in larger clubs to support the busy positions and for organizing particular projects by reducing the workload.
- By having a Membership Development Plan to bring in new members.
