From the feedback PAWA received, our Building Better Clubs workshops proved to be beneficial to the attendees, particularly in clarifying various aspects of club management. The workshops placed a strong emphasis on providing clarity and simplifying Committee roles and responsibilities. Participants were able to gain more understanding of realistic tasks and obligations associated with their positions, enabling them to fulfil their roles more effectively and contribute to their Club's success. As was presented, the world around us is changing and Clubs need to adapt to new circumstances.

Moreover, the workshops also focused on demystifying the "entrenched views and perceptions" as to the Club Constitution, Standing Resolutions and the PSPL Probus Club Handbook and other "policy" guidelines. PAWA attempted to provide a clear understanding of these "rules" and guidelines to help Clubs foster transparency and consistency in decision-making processes. We need to all remember that a Probus Club is not a mining company, or a bank and the focus must be on *fun, friendship, and fellowship* and not management by "rules".

A key aspect was on the interpreting of the guidelines set out in the PSPL Club Handbook which all too often many Clubs interpret as "rules". Participants were given clarification and insights into best practices for practically applying these guidelines. Topics such as privacy interpretation and insurance clarification (regarding outings and activities) were specifically addressed. Attendees were provided with the knowledge necessary to navigate potential legal and risk-related challenges and the understanding that the requirements are not as complex as perceived.

One of the key highlights of the Workshops has been the opportunity for attendees to sit with others in breakout groups. These group sessions enabled an open exchange of approaches and ideas between different clubs. As participants shared their experiences, challenges, and successes, they were able to gain invaluable insights into the diverse ways in which clubs can achieve their goals. PAWA hopes that this collaborative environment encouraged innovation and the adoption of best practices, ultimately benefiting all attendees and their respective clubs.

By attending PAWA's Building Better Clubs workshops, individuals not only acquired a better and more practical understanding of their roles and responsibilities but also gained insights that a Management Committee role is not as complex as they may have been led to believe from job descriptions, guidelines and "internal historical knowledge".

Finally, all of us, both attendees and PAWA Committee members, were able to meet each other and learn from each other's' experiences.

As I have realised "We all do the same thing, but we do it differently!"

Why do you have to report?

The WA Associations Incorporation ACT (2015) and the Associations Incorporation Regulations (2016) require that Probus Clubs provide a report to DMIRS each year to prove to the Department that your Club is still eligible to be incorporated and is adhering to the Act and Regulations. If the report is not lodged, the Department is able to deregister the association for not complying with the Act or Regulations.

What is the information that they want?

The report is not time consuming and is easy to complete with only the following questions being asked:

- Club name
- Club address for communications
- Does the association currently have at least six voting members?
- When did your club hold its last Annual General Meeting (AGM)?
- What was the Club's total revenue for its last financial year?

Note: Revenue is the total amount of money received or earned by the association in a financial year.

When completing the form, DMIRS and Associations Online state that a generic email is **NOT** to be used. Your private email address is requested. This is because generic emails cannot be passed on as they are owned by the person who set them up the first-time around. The report must come from a current legal Officer of the Club.

If your club has not been updating each year you will need to complete the "missing" yearly reports to bring reporting up to date.

Who should be preparing the report?

Annual reports must be completed by a legal Officer of the Club (President, Treasurer or Secretary) and a personal email address for that officer is to be used.

Graham Jenke. HISTORY of WIRELESS HILL. Convenor, Friends of Wireless Hill.

Wireless Hill was the 40-hectare site selected for one of Australia's first radio telegraph stations in 1911 – the other was in Sydney. The station operated until 1968 after which the land was transferred to the City of Melville to become public open space and a Bush Forever reserve.

Friends of Wireless Hill have been working ever since to restore the bushland to its original condition. This talk describes the history of the radio station and the site's restoration.
