

SENIORS WEEK. "Have a Go Day"

Wednesday 15th November

Have a Go Day, a LiveLighter event, has been run by Seniors Recreation Council since its inception in 1992. The event is the largest single event specifically targeted at the over 55's demographic. A mix of over 200 static sites and activities makes this event unique to Western Australia, held in the beautiful grounds of Burswood Park for the last 30 years. It is designed to make seniors aware of the importance of exercise, socialisation and both physical and mental activity.

As with many of our Clubs, nine months ago the Combined Probus Club of Mosman Park was faced with having to make the tough choice to fold due to lack of office bearers. Two of the PAWA Committee members had visited the Club previously to offer creative and informative tips on how the Club might resolve the problem of attracting officers.

At the AGM, after much discussion, foundation member Carol Kennedy was willing to put forward her nomination as Secretary and this was accepted. So now the Club has a Secretary. Then, to save the Club, a last-minute nomination was put forward for Robert Doney, another long-term member, as President. Robert then agreed to stand provided that Bernard Kessell be nominated as Vice President. Bernard was recently retired and had little background in the Club's traditions.

Now the Club has a President, Secretary and Vice President. After some further cajoling, Bernard's wife Sandra decided (with some trepidation) to take on the role of Treasurer.

So finally, from a legal standpoint, the Club had the necessary officers to continue operation for the following year.

Having overcome this major hurdle, the Club recognised that it also needed to attract new and younger members so that the Club could continue to be viable into the future. The President's wife, Lyn Doney took it upon herself to devise a plan to promote the Club in October - Probus month.

The plan was to hold an Open Day during Probus month and an enthusiastic and committed committee was set up and, with Lyn's drive and energy and ideas, a promotional plan was developed. With a number of members' involvement, the promotions were devised and set into place. With publicity in the local Post newspaper, word of mouth, notices on community notice boards, distribution of pamphlets and flyers by members and use of the City of Mosman Park notice boards, the word soon spread within the community.

Finally, at the big event on 4th October, 25 new prospective members attended the Open Day meeting. Unfortunately, some 10 others were refused due to the RSVP date and catering reasons. However, these people will be followed up and invited to the Club's next meeting.

Goes to show what a committed and enthusiastic group of members can accomplish!

PSPL REVIEW OF STANDARD PROBUS CLUB CONSTITUTION

Recently, Probus Club management will have received advice from PSPL about proposed changes to the standard Probus Club Constitution. A review of the Constitution has been ongoing for some time.



When a Probus Club is formed, it adopts the PSPL Preamble and the 12 Articles of Accreditation, which together comprise the standard Probus Club Model Constitution that complies with the legislative requirements for their particular State/Territory. In the current Incorporated Models, the Preamble and Articles of Accreditation are represented in **bold and italic typeface** and are the same for all Probus Clubs across Australia.

The first stage of the PSPL review is to seek feedback from Clubs about proposed changes to the Preamble and Articles of Accreditation. This is what has been sent out to WA Clubs so far.

It should be noted that the document that Clubs have received does not represent a legally valid Club Constitution under the WA Associations Act.

Under PSPL's Constitution, changes cannot be made to either the Preamble or the Articles of Accreditation if more than 25% of Clubs object to the proposed change. For this reason, PSPL is providing WA Clubs with ample opportunity to consider the proposed changes.

The period of consultation with Clubs will close on 15 December 2023.

Shortly after the consultation period closes, PSPL proposes to provide Clubs with Model Constitutions and Model Standing Resolutions for both incorporated and unincorporated Clubs. This should provide flexibility for Clubs to manage their internal affairs by way of Standing Resolutions rather than By-laws, which are an outdated concept.

SCAM WARNING

Western Australian seniors are being urged to be aware of a scam WA Seniors Card website which attempts to charge applicants a fee in exchange for a Seniors Card.

Seniors should be aware that the legitimate WA Seniors Card is always free of charge and applicants are never requested to pay a fee or disclose their bank or credit card details in exchange for membership .

The official WA Seniors Card is <u>www.seniorscard.wa.gov.au</u> Applicants should look for the official State crest to ensure they are accessing a trusted and secure website before proceeding with an application for membership.

PROBUS MEMBERS PERSONAL INFORMATION and PRIVACY

Probians have a variety of reasons for seeking to join a Probus club, foremost among them being to enjoy fun, friendship and fellowship with others. Many of us have formed new, valued and enduring friendships with members of our club.

This is only possible by members sharing some personal details with others in the club. Indeed, the effective ongoing management of any successful club, be it Probus or some other community group, depends on this occurrence.

The importance of this aspect of a club is recognized in the **ASSOCIATIONS INCORPORATIONS ACT 2015** which requires all clubs to maintain a register of members, including name, date of membership and an address (residential, postal or email). Your secretary is required to keep this information at their home or some other nominated place. Importantly all members are entitled to inspect the register and make a copy or extract.

On applying to join a Probus club prospective members sign a member application form whereby they consent to their names, addresses, telephone number and email address being included in the directory of members. This information is to be distributed to club members only. Some information is provided to PSPL, which manages it in accordance with their **Privacy Policy.**

As you would know, clubs may also publish in their newsletter and/or social media photographs of its members enjoying club activities. This is a great communication mechanism and can facilitate members getting to know one another.

However, should a member not wish to have their photograph published they can opt out by advising the Secretary in writing that they do not give consent. A similar provision applies in relation to PSPL publications. This is an important check and balance available to members.

While the **PRIVACY ACT 1988** does not apply to Probus Clubs (as their \$ turnover falls below the threshold of \$3m/year), the management committee have a duty of care to handle members' personal information diligently. Any concerns about the treatment of your personal details should be directed to the club secretary in the first instance.
