GET RID OF CASH IN YOUR CLUB.

There is more and more of a push in our society to get rid of cash payments at Club meeting. Devices are available where members can simply swipe their credit/debit card and make an immediate payment to the Club for an event or activity.

Square is one example of a point-of-sale electronic transaction system. Many businesses and non-profit organisations now use **Square** to provide credit card and debit card payment services to their customers or members. These devices allow point-of-sale electronic transactions.

Advantages of using Electronic payments

- 1. Less handling of cash at meetings and trips to a bank.
- 2. Receipts can be easily generated. They can be printed, emailed, or sent by text message, depending on the hardware you purchase and whether you are online or not.
- 3. **Square** can allow generation of reports to analyse trends in club activities. Funds received can be automatically transferred to the club's bank account.
- 4. Many people use tap-and-go payments by card, mobile phone, or smart watch for their purchases.
- 5. You can create separate items within the **Square** system for meeting attendance fee, annual membership fee, pro-rata joining fee, and individual outings with the one 'tap'.

Things to consider:

A. Initial purchase of Square hardware and potential future replacement cost.





For the devices, check with the **Square** website for pricing but also shop around at places like JB Hi-Fi and Officeworks or through a Council grant.

There are two main options to consider:

SQUARE card reader

SQUARE terminal

Square Card Reader: This must be connected to a smartphone via Bluetooth at the time of the transaction (no screen on the device itself). They are relatively low cost to purchase, but the transaction fee is a little higher (1.9% of the transaction amount).

Square Terminal: This device has a screen and can accept a 'tap' without being online, although it must be connected to Wi-Fi within 24 hours to be fully processed. The screen can show all items available for purchase, as set up by the user. The transaction fee is lower, (1.6% of the transaction amount). The Terminal has a paper roll and can print receipts, even if not online at the time of the transaction. Both have rechargeable batteries.

B. Creation of an account with Square via the Square website.

Square will require an Australian Business Number (ABN) for the club and contact details for key committee members (President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer). They will also need you to upload a copy of the Club's Certificate of Incorporation. You supply them with the club's BSB and bank account number and set up an automatic transfer function from your **Square** account to the club's bank account.

C. Application for ABN

This can be made at: https://www.abr.gov.au/business-super-funds-charities/applying-abn You apply as **Other Incorporated Entity** (an Incorporated Association). Main business activity is Social Club Operation. The nature of your activity is 'In the form of a business'. Don't register for GST or apply for a tax file number. You will be asked for name, date of birth, address, and tax file number for the key committee members, as listed above for the Square application. These committee members go under the category Office Bearer of a Club/Association. **Square website:** <u>https://squareup.com/au/en</u>

∴ RESEARCH and writing my novel-ACACIA HOUSE

Vivien trained as a nurse and midwife and became a Palliative Care nurse. She studied creative writing at UWA, culminating in a PhD.



My presentation starts with a discussion of advance care planning and palliative care, and I attempt to dispel a few common myths and misconceptions.

Then I give an overview of the research and writing of my novel, *Acacia House*, which has a palliative care central theme, and which was shortlisted for the WA Premier's Book Awards in 2023. It is the first self-published novel ever to be shortlisted for the awards. The novel is about three nurses working in a Perth Hospice in the 1990's.
