

### PREPARING FOR YOUR AGM

### With March just around the corner, no doubt you will already be planning for your AGM.

An important part of the preparation for this meeting is ensuring you have candidates for all the key roles. The legal requirement under the WA Associations Act is for a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer and <u>at least one other</u>.

These candidates should have been named by financial Club members on the Nomination Form issued in January and they should have agreed to be nominated. They will also be asked if they accept the nomination at the AGM. Nominations should be received for the February meeting in advance of the AGM.

As President, you will need to ensure that formal advice of the AGM has been sent to all members at least 21 days ahead of the date of the AGM. The advice should include:

- the minutes of the previous year's AGM,
- the annual financial statement,
- the Agenda,
- any proposed changes to the Standing Resolutions, and
- Proxy Voting forms.

Your AGM can be either a separate meeting or part of your regular March meeting. However, you will need to close off the general meeting before commencing the formal AGM. The AGM requires separate minutes.

In addition, you will require a Returning Officer (or Chair) for the AGM. This can be a financial Club member (who is not nominated for any role) or an external third party such as a member of your sponsoring Rotary Club. The role of the Returning Officer is to manage any voting as regard any proposed changes to Standing Resolutions and the election of Club Officers. This person will take over the meeting following the delivery of the President's and Treasurer's reports.

It is commonplace that the President delivers a verbal report of the year's activities, and the Treasurer speaks to the annual financial statement as previously sent out to members at the beginning of the AGM.

All existing Committee positions are declared vacant prior to the actual election. Some Clubs perceive that the previous year's Vice President automatically assume the role of President for the coming year. They must be elected by the members at the AGM. Newly elected Committee members take office immediately.

As regards nominations, the Returning Officer will advise those present at the meeting of the nominations – position by position. They will ask the nominated candidates if they accept the nomination.

Should you have only one member nominated for a position, the member nominated is deemed to be elected. However, if there is more than one candidate for any of the positions, a vote is taken, generally by show of hands, after the candidates have left the room. The vote count should include any Proxy Votes.

If any position remains vacant, the Returning Officer may call for nominations from the floor of the AGM. In the case that no nominations are received, the Returning Officer declares the position vacant. It can be filled at a later date by the management committee.

# JUDITH ODGAARDSUSTAINABLE POPULATION AUSTRALIA : WA Branch President.A rapid history of population, and that growth of such is no longer needed and is most undesirable.



I spent much of my childhood travelling this State's station and wheatbelt country while my father selected sites to drill for water. Hearing his comments re: condition of the land and whether good or bad management practices had evidently been conducted, I absorbed a concern and love for the country. Of my gainfully employed life, a number of years was as a laboratory assistant with the Institute of Agriculture, several years in a geological laboratory concurrent with ten years interviewing with the Bureau of Census and Statistics, followed as a science technician in several colleges from the 70s till now.

My undergraduate degree was in visual arts, and psychology. The visual art practice involved installations dealing with salinity and sustainability while my PhD researched attitudes and behaviours of Graduate Diploma of Education (Primary) Students' regarding their perceptions of sustainability.

**Vision**: A relationship between people and the environment in which the human population stays within planetary boundaries.

Mission: To establish Australia as a model of a sustainable environment that protects

species and human wellbeing with emphasis on population size.

### **Objectives**:

- Contribute to the public awareness of the limits of Australian population from ecological, social, and economic viewpoints.
- Promote awareness that an ecologically sustainable population depends on its renewable resources.
- Promote low fertility and low migration policies to stabilise then reduce Australia's population.
- Advocate low immigration while rejecting any criteria based on race, ethnicity, or religion.
- Promote policies to stabilise then reduce global population.
- Why it is necessary to end to population growth and how this can be done fairly.
- How to achieve an ecologically sustainable population immigration for Australia
- Practical government policies towards a stable and sustainable population

### **PROFESSOR DAVID M HUNT BSc PhD FRSB**

Emeritus Professor, University of Western Australia and University College London, and Fellow of the Royal Society of Biology.




David is a member of the Probus Club of Mandurah Peel. "I am now retired but still involved in the development of a gene therapy cure for blindness at the Lions Eye Institute. Over my career in academia, I have been a contributor to over 250 scientific papers, and several books, which have largely dealt with the genetic basis for colour vision across the animal kingdom and the identification of the gene mutations responsible for many inherited blinding disorders in humans."


### **Proposed Talks**

### 1. Colour vison, facts, and fallacies

Why are up to 10% of the male population colour blind? John Dalton, the famous chemist, was the first person to describe colour blindness in a study of his own colour vison published in 1798, hence the disorder is frequently called "daltonism". Our study published in the journal Science identified the type of colour vision defect he had. Is colour vision generally present throughout the animal kingdom and how does it compare to our own colour vision? In evolutionary terms, how ancient is colour vision? The talk will draw substantially on published work carried out in my laboratory in London and more recently at the University of Western Australia in Perth.







### 2. The Royal Maladies: porphyria and haemophilia

The medical basis for the madness of King George III continues to be debated. The talk will recount our extensive efforts to identify the basis of the madness and how widespread it may have been in the Royal Families of Europe, as presented in our book entitled "Purple Secret: Genes, madness and the Royal Houses of Europe" co-authored with John Rohl and Martin Warren. I will also cover the clotting disease called haemophilia that was passed on by Queen Victoria to her children, including Alexei, the son born in 1904 into the Russian Romanov Family that was tragically killed by the **Bolshevik revolutionaries** in July 1918.
