WELCOME TO THE OCTOBER 2024 EDITION of NEWS and NOTES



I would like to briefly touch on two key topics in my note i.e. Management Committee membership and attracting new and younger members.

All too often, our Clubs face the challenge of getting members to actively participate in the Management Committee. Many members are content to enjoy the benefits of the club without contributing to its organisation, citing "I don't have the time" as a common excuse. This response often reflects a reluctance to prioritise club involvement over other personal activities, rather than a genuine lack of time.

To address this, clubs must promote the importance of shared responsibility. Highlight how participation ensures the club's smooth operation and longevity, benefiting all members. Reframing committee work as a fulfilling way to contribute to the community can also help. Sharing testimonials from current or past committee members who have found the experience rewarding could be persuasive.

In addition, clear communication about the role's demands is essential. Many members may not realise that committee responsibilities are often manageable and flexible and not as complex as perceived. Creating smaller, well-defined tasks or short-term roles can reduce the intimidation factor. Regularly rotating committee positions also ensures that responsibilities are spread more evenly over time, preventing burnout and encouraging more participation.

Did you know that the inability to form a management committee is the most common recent reason why a number of our clubs have shut down!

One of the key challenges for many Probus Clubs is attracting younger members, particularly those 10–15 years younger than the average age of the existing membership. Traditional methods like "bring a friend" or letterbox drops are not enough to maintain sustainable growth. Raising the club's profile in the local community is an essential starting point.

To do this, clubs need to become more visible through local media, partnerships with community organisations, and by maintaining an active online presence. Engaging content on social media, updates on community boards, and possibly even collaboration with local businesses for sponsorship or events could attract younger retirees.

Equally important is ensuring that the club offers engaging, varied activities that appeal to a broader audience. Meetings should be dynamic, featuring guest speakers, relevant topics, and events that reflect the interests of younger retirees. Social outings, workshops, and special interest groups can be tailored to appeal to different age groups, making the club feel inclusive and vibrant. By evolving with the times, Probus Clubs can continue to grow and thrive.

In 1984 Val Smith, President of Rotary District 946, initiated action to form an Association of all Probus Club in WA.
The reason behind this was due to the remoteness of Western Australian Clubs from the Probus Centre in Sydney.

In May 1984 representatives of all nineteen Probus Clubs, accredited in WA, attended a meeting hosted by the Probus Club of Floreat. Fred Carden, Past President of the Willetton Probus Club was chairman of this meeting. The meeting resolved that the Probus Association of Western Australia (PAWA) be formed and that a committee be formed under the chairmanship of Fred Carden.

PAWA became the first State Association in Australia. From the outset, it was made clear that PAWA was formed to co-ordinate, advise and to supply information relative to the official Probus Policy. Under no circumstances would PAWA dictate to Clubs or in any way interfere with the day to day running of the member Clubs. George Hardingham the first Secretary of PAWA met with officials of the Probus Centre - South Pacific in Sydney and outlined the reasoning that led to the formation of PAWA. George stressed that PAWA was to be a service centre for W.A Clubs.

At a Special General Meeting of PAWA held in November 1984, Fred Carden was elected inaugural President, Gordon Mann as Vice President, and George Hardingham as Secretary/Treasurer and together with five committee members formed the Management Committee. The five committee members were: - Ali Sharr, Stan Braybrook, Lorna Ryan, Cyril Gibson and Eric Wilkinson. At this time, there were twenty-five Clubs in W.A. All these Clubs chose to be members of PAWA. Since then, all newly formed WA Probus Clubs have also chosen to become members of PAWA.

Over the years the PAWA Management Committee, elected at the Annual General Meeting, has continued to meet monthly. Many Probians have contributed their time and efforts on these Management Committees to help ensure the success of Probus in WA.

PROBUS was started by Rotary which is a service and fundraising organisation. The original idea was that PROBUS would serve those Rotarians who reached retirement age and wished to step down from service but wanted to continue the social aspect of Rotary.

Therefore PROBUS was never meant to be a fundraising organisation, only a social club for retirees. Indeed, in many countries, it is explicitly stated in club constitutions that it may not fundraise. Most Probians support charities individually (such as health research, animal shelters or environmental projects), but if they wish to fundraise actively, they are encouraged to support a Rotary club effort.

As PROBUS evolved, in some countries, (e.g. India) clubs have adopted a charity or cause they aid. Clubs may add to their coffers through raffles or sponsorships but may not donate to any charity from these general funds without a vote of approval of its membership (not just the Management Committee).

Probus Clubs do fundraise, but mostly not fundraise.
