Professor Kennedy specialises in the Roman Near East. David has conducted annual aerial reconnaissance over Jordan as part of the Aerial Archaeology in Jordan project.

His talk: The Roman Empire was not the biggest or longest lasting or most powerful or most civilized or most developed ... but it was near the top in every category. In many respects it seems almost modern – nearer to us than to its predecessors and many of its successors. The lecture will explore how and why it was 'almost modern' and why it did not become modern.

Succession Planning

Why is this important? The answer is it assists clubs by making them ready to move forward in an orderly fashion. Some clubs may say: "We don't need it! Our club members are always willing to stand as officers. Our members don't want to pre-plan."

Whilst this may be the case, please remember that, with succession planning, you can achieve the following:

- Existing programs can continue
- There is no need to reinvent the wheel each year
- Have appropriate people in place the round peg in the round hole
- Offer vice presidents, assistant officers and members of sub committees a chance to move into the main job

How can we achieve this?

- By making sure members understand the role of the management committee
- Planning early so members have time to consider taking on a role
- Appointing assistants for secretary, treasurer, outings and activity officer
- Giving potential committee members the opportunity to be involved in running special projects
