Thank you for your endorsement of the new PAWA Committee at our recent AGM.

I am honoured to continue as your President and look forward to what we can achieve together in the year ahead.

I would like to extend my sincere apology for the short notice given to Clubs regarding the PAWA levy increase. Please be assured this was not a decision taken lightly. The Committee debated the matter thoroughly and carefully considered all implications before reaching a conclusion albeit late in the day.

On a positive note, I'm pleased to report that our first Building Better Clubs Workshop, held at Sorrento, was a great success. Twelve Clubs participated, with 44 members in attendance, and the feedback received has been overwhelmingly positive. The next Workshop will take place at Halls Head, and I encourage local Clubs to attend—not only to gain fresh insights but also to connect, share experiences, and support one another in our common goals.

Looking ahead, PAWA faces two key challenges.

The first is to guide and support our WA Clubs in adopting the new "standard" Probus Club Constitution and accompanying Standing Resolutions template. PAWA President and Past Joondalup City President Ralph contributed to the PSPL Focus Group behind this work, and his Club (Joondalup City Probus) served as the successful WA test case with DEMIRS in December 2024.

The second challenge relates to PSPL's clear commitment to the establishment of new Probus Clubs in WA. During the last 12 months, PAWA has been reluctant to start new Clubs and has focused on ensuring existing Clubs remain viable. However, we have now agreed to collaborate with PSPL on this initiative. I want to assure you that any steps to form new Clubs will involve consultation with existing Clubs that may be impacted by a new Club in "their area".

Together, with open communication and shared purpose, we can take steps to try to strengthen Probus across Western Australia.

Looking for something different for members to do during a sundowner?? May I suggest a race with a difference? I'm the Outings & Activity Officer for the Probus Club of Mandurah Peel. The above photo shows me humbly receiving the inaugural trophy for a new game introduced by Toni, at our recent sundowner.

This new game involved "pulling" an item, tied to a piece of string, carefully winding it up on a spindle over a set distance. Participants compete against each other and the one who completes the task quickest, is the winner.



Toni hails from England and has retained her pommie accent, so when she told me about this new game that her family had enjoyed playing on Christmas Day, I thought it involved tying a piece of string around a scone and carefully pulling or sliding it along without breaking it.
