

WELCOME TO THE JUNE 2025 EDITION of NEWS and NOTES



Once again, the PAWA team has successfully conducted a series of six "Building Better Clubs" Workshops across WA. These sessions provided valuable opportunities for inter-club networking, sharing of experiences, and identifying common challenges. A number of important issues emerged during the discussions, including insurance coverage (visitors, partners and guests), the organisation of outings, and risk management.

There was also much interest and debate around the new Probus Constitution and associated Standing Resolutions. In response to these, PAWA will be issuing a series of advisory papers over the next ten days to offer clarity and practical guidance on these matters.

A reminder to all Clubs: PSPL and PAWA are entirely separate entities. They operate independently and do not share administrative or operational information.

One issue that continues to cause confusion is capitation fees. Clubs should note that PSPL will issue a capitation fee invoice to Clubs only after a Club has completed and submitted its annual online return, in which membership numbers are declared. PAWA's levy, on the other hand, is an entirely separate financial obligation and is payable directly to PAWA upon receipt of an invoice.

Another important administrative matter raised in the Workshops relates to the annual return to DEMIRS. This return must be submitted through the Associations Online portal, and PAWA encourages all Clubs to ensure timely compliance with this requirement.

In terms of future development, PSPL has expressed a strong interest in establishing new Probus Clubs in Western Australia. After careful consideration, PAWA has agreed to collaborate on this initiative. Three areas have been identified for potential new Clubs: Wanneroo, Armadale, and Mt Lawley/Mt Hawthorn. Investigations will continue in the coming months, and any Clubs potentially affected will be fully consulted before any action is taken.

Finally, a reminder that two major annual events are on the horizon: Pasta in the Valley in October, and the long-standing South West Get Together in Mandurah. PAWA initiated this regional gathering over 20 years ago, and it continues to be a highlight of the Probus calendar. *Ralph Sirmulis*

CAR POOLING AND INSURANCE. Topic discussed at a breakout group.

There are no provisions in either the National Insurance Program or PSPL guidelines that prohibit car-pooling for approved Probus activities.

The Australian National Insurance Program offers personal injury coverage for travel to and from approved Probus events, including meetings.

This means participants are insured—subject to the policy's terms and conditions—while travelling to or from a Probus-approved activity. This includes instances where a member is picking up or dropping off another member at their home or original departure point.

However, it's important to understand that this insurance does not cover damage to any motor vehicle used during such activities. Responsibility for any vehicle damage lies with the vehicle's own insurance policy.

Additionally, if an accident occurs and an insurance excess applies, this cost is not covered by the National Insurance Program. The vehicle owner is personally responsible for paying the excess—not the Probus Club.

The Program does, however, provide personal injury coverage if a participant is injured in a vehicle during an approved Probus activity.

COMMUNICATION WITHIN THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

PAWA directs all communications to both the Secretary and President of each Club. The Secretary typically serves as the central channel for both incoming and outgoing correspondence and maintains the official records of the Club. The President, as the elected head, provides leadership and oversight. Our expectation is that important information received from PAWA will be shared promptly with the rest of the Management Committee and, where relevant, with the broader membership.

However, feedback from recent Workshops has highlighted that internal communication within some Management Committees could be strengthened. It is essential that communication among Committee members is ongoing—not limited to General or Committee meetings—and that all Committee members remain informed and involved in decision-making.

A particular concern raised during the Workshops is the transition of Committee roles. When a new member takes on a committee position, it is vital that they receive a proper handover from their predecessor. This should include practical advice on the role's day-to-day responsibilities, Club-specific practices, and any local requirements. Simply referring a new officer to the PSPL Handbook may not be sufficient and, in some cases, could cause confusion if it doesn't align with legal obligations i.e. government or insurance.

Ultimately, the Management Committee should function as a cohesive team, working collaboratively for the benefit of the entire Club. Effective communication is the foundation of successful teamwork. PAWA encourages all Committees to place a strong emphasis on open, timely, and regular communication to ensure the smooth and harmonious running of Club affairs.

MEETINGS ARE THE BACKBONE OF RUNNING AN EFFICIENT CLUB.

The President or designated Chairman needs to be familiar with the Constitution and Standing Resolutions and be able to answer any questions regarding these documents.

- An Agenda approved by the President must be sent to members prior to the meeting.
- A notice of a motion for the agenda should be submitted 21 days prior to the meeting.
- Consider a 'meet and greet' person to welcome everyone.
- Ensure the meeting starts & finishes on time. Ensure there is a quorum.
- Do not get bogged down in rules and "procedures". Use common sense. Keep it simple.
- Confirm the amount of time required for the guest speaker to prevent overruns in time.
- New motions are placed on the next month's agenda to allow consideration by members
- Consider a theme or dress code for special occasions.
- Allow adequate time for socialising at morning tea.

Where a meeting needs to determine a matter, it is up to the Chairman to keep control of discussions before a motion or amendment is put forward to be voted on either in favour or against. If the vote is tied, the Chairman has the deciding vote.

DOCUMENTATION REQUIRED FOR OUTINGS/ACTIVITIES

Many Clubs are confused about the documentation required in relation to members attending outings and activities and this confusion is engendered by the perception that insurance coverage is the reason.

There is no specific rule in either the National Insurance Program document or any PSPL documentation that defines what documentation is required for members attending an Outing/Activity. Approval of an activity should be reflected in the Club's minutes that meets management guidelines and contains sufficient information as to what is being approved.

The only mention of a need for a record is in the PSPL Risk Management Policy Guidelines and succinctly states:

There should be a record of all participants - a tick against an attendee's name is sufficient for insurance purposes.

Clubs should note that this means those who actually attend and not those who put their name down to attend and paid their fee beforehand. This list needs to be retained by the Club Secretary and kept for a minimum of 13 months.

The PSPL Probus Club Handbook <u>recommends</u> the use of the *Registration Form for Outings, Activities and Tours* (available for download from the PSPL website) for visitors and non-members of a Club. Again, this is a recommendation only.

This Form has been adopted by a number of Clubs to encompass all members, visitors and non-members and differing versions are used within a number of Clubs across the country.

That is their decision but it has no bearing on Insurance but can add a burden on the duties of the Outings Officer.
