Throughout the year, PAWA Committee members have visited many Clubs, gaining valuable insights into how Clubs are faring and what issues we may need to address going into 2026. One matter that many Clubs do not fully appreciate is the distinction between PAWA and PSPL. They are separate and independent organisations that collaborate closely to support WA Probus Clubs. PAWA was established in 1984 by the WA Clubs themselves to represent their interests and to provide local support, education and guidance. This is why each WA Club is entitled, and encouraged, to have representation on the PAWA Committee.

Since our reinvigoration five years ago, I believe, and many Clubs have endorsed, that PAWA has made strong progress in supporting Clubs. However, like any organisation, we must periodically assess how effectively we are meeting your expectations. PAWA is now undertaking a self-assessment to identify how we can better serve you, our stakeholders, and we will be seeking your input as part of this important process.

To continue fulfilling our role effectively, we do need more enthusiastic members to join the PAWA Committee. Your experience, insight, and energy are invaluable and essential.

The changes to the *Associations Incorporation Act 2015 (WA)* offer Probus Clubs in Western Australia increased flexibility and modern governance options. *They are not mandatory overhauls but rather opportunities for clubs to update their operations to match contemporary practices.*

Here is how these changes specifically affect WA Probus Clubs:

Increased Flexibility for Meetings:

- Probus clubs can now leverage technology to hold meetings (e.g., via Zoom) and allow members to vote remotely, which is particularly beneficial for members who may be less mobile or live in remote areas.
- Clubs do not need to amend their rules to use technology for meetings, provided their current rules (Standing Resolutions) do not explicitly *forbid* it. They only need to ensure their members can effectively participate in the meeting if they choose the technology option.

Governance and Compliance:

- Clubs must ensure their rules identify the specific officer or member responsible for lodging documents with Consumer Protection, such as annual statements and changes to office holders. This person is typically the Secretary or Treasurer and defined in the Standing Resolutions.
- The increased power of the Commissioner to cancel an association's incorporation more quickly may prompt clubs to be more diligent in meeting their annual reporting obligations to maintain their incorporated status.

Financial Management:

 While many Probus clubs do not require an audit due to their size and income, those that do now have the option to appoint an auditor or reviewer for a fixed term (2-5 years), providing certainty and regular review of the appointment.

Member Relations:

 The improved appeal rights for expelled members could require clubs to ensure their expulsion processes are fair and well-documented, as members have clearer access to appeal to the State Administrative Tribunal (SAT) if they feel unjustly treated.

In essence, the amendments provide Probus clubs with modern tools to operate more efficiently and flexibly while ensuring robust compliance and accountability measures are maintained. Clubs may wish to review their existing rules to see how they can best take advantage of these new options.

For WA Probus Clubs, which are typically incorporated associations, the recent amendments offer greater operational flexibility and modern governance options. The key changes allow clubs to adapt their practices to better suit the needs of their members.

The most significant impacts are:

- **Flexible Meetings:** Clubs can now easily hold meetings and votes using technology (like video calls), which can boost participation for members who find it difficult to attend in person, especially those in regional areas or with mobility challenges. This is the new default position, so clubs can use this unless their rules state otherwise.
- Adaptable Auditor Appointments: Clubs have the option to appoint an auditor or reviewer for a set term of 2 to 5 years, which can help in managing governance and administrative processes efficiently.
- Clearer Rules on Personal Information: Upcoming changes will allow members to request that their personal details on the member register be restricted in certain circumstances (e.g., for safety reasons). If this happens, the club secretary will still be responsible for passing on relevant club information to that member.
- Guidance and Compliance: PSPL already provides a handbook as guidance to clubs on best practices for management and governance, and these new legislative changes fit within that framework, offering flexibility rather than rigid rules. Clubs should review their current Constitutions and Standing Resolutions to ensure they align with the new Act, especially if they wish to opt out of the technology-enabled meeting provisions.

PLANNING YOUR AGM

As the year draws to a close, it is timely to be thinking about your club's AGM.

The AGM must be held on or before 31 March and is therefore the last meeting of the Probus year. There are a number of steps that need to occur before this date including notice of the meeting, the agenda and perhaps proxy voting forms.

Now is a good time to make your members aware that all Management Committee positions are declared vacant at the AGM and nominees will be elected at the meeting itself. This gives plenty of time for interested parties to discover what each role entails and make an informed decision before nominating for any position.

It is a good idea to mention to the members who the best people are to approach for information about specific positions. By doing this, hopefully, you can demystify what is involved in each role and encourage members to apply. Job descriptions can be provided by the current Management Committee members.

Given the date of the AGM, nominations are usually called for at the General Meeting prior to the February General Meeting and should be lodged with the Secretary by the February General Meeting. However, if there are positions remaining vacant by the time of the AGM, nominations can be accepted from the floor. Nominations are usually proposed and seconded by two financial Club members.

Proxy Votes:

If a member is unable to attend a meeting, they may wish to provide a proxy vote. The Recommended Constitution provides that proxies are accepted by the Secretary up to 48 hours prior to the meeting. The club needs to consider how many Proxies a member can hold.

Note: Honorary and non-active members do not count for a quorum.

NEW CONSTITUTION

Once a Club has the support of its membership to adopt the new Constitution, it must lodge the document with DLGIRS (Department of Local Government, Industrial Relations and Safety) along with a lodgement fee of \$40 and a Form05.

Note that DLGIRS identifies that there are two types of Constitutions from Incorporated bodies. The first is the "model" Constitution which follows the DLGIRS template.

The second is a "custom" Constitution which does not follow the DLGIRS template. Both the current and previous PSPL Probus Club Constitutions are considered to be "custom."

The DLGIRS Form05 was provided by PSPL for all clubs. It is essentially a checklist of the 19 points that any incorporated bodies' Constitution must address in order to conform with the WA Associations Act. Only after receiving formal endorsement from DLGIRS can the new Constitution be officially adopted by the Club.

Standing Resolutions, on the other hand, require only Club membership approval and **do not** need to be lodged or externally endorsed.

Clubs should NOT be changing the Constitution from that provided by PSPL without PSPL endorsement - except for the start/end date of year, the official name of the Club and the footer.
